**Mississippi College Names Stephen Glaze
Humanities Professor for 2002**

CLINTON October is Arts and Humanities Month, proclaimed annually by the President of the United States and the Governor. The Mississippi Humanities Council will celebrate the occasion by supporting Humanities Teacher Awards to the humanities faculty member chosen at each higher educational institution.

Dr. Lee G. Royce, president, and Dr. Ron Howard, dean of the college of arts & sciences, has named Dr. Stephen Glaze, professor in the Art Department, for the 2002 Mississippi College Humanities Professor.

Stephen Glaze, is widely recognized as an artist, sculptor, and potter. His commissioned works grace many facilities throughout the United States, including Jackson Academy, Jackson, MS; Fallen Fire Fighter's Memorial Fund, which is a life-size bronze monument; and Heartbeat of an EMT, a painting commissioned by the National Association of Emergency Medical Technicians that was reproduced and sold nationally. Steve Glaze also presents art devotionals throughout Mississippi, and has presented them in Missouri and Virginia.

Dr. Glaze is married to Ruth Glaze, also a professor in the art department and also an acclaimed artist and sculptor. The Glaze's have three children, and are active members in the First Baptist Church, Clinton.

Glaze will make a public presentation based on scholarly research and art performance on Tuesday, October 29th, at 7 p.m. in Aven Auditorium. The title of the presentation is "Expressing spiritual Content Through Art." Faculty, Staff, Students and the community are invited. There will be a reception in Aven Lobby following the presentation.

Dr. Glaze will be recognized at the Mississippi Humanities Council awards dinner on February 7, 2003, which will also be the celebration of the Council's 30th anniversary.

The Mississippi College Speech and Debate Team placed third in the Over-All Sweepstakes Competition at the "Weevil Wars" Debate Tournament on the campus of the University of Arkansas-Monticello, October 12-13, 2002. The Choctaws placed five out of six debaters in elimination rounds.

Beth Lunyou led the way in the Novice Division. She finished the preliminary rounds with a 6-0 record before making it all the way to the finals of the elimination rounds. Lunyou also finished 5th in the Novice Top Speaker competition. Also in the Novice Division, Ben Cantrell finished the prelims at 4-2, making it to the quarter-finals. Colin Sims contributed two points in the prelims, going 2-4.

In the Varsity Division, the Choctaws placed all three of their debaters. Holly Roberts led the way in the prelims, going 5-1 before bowing out in the octo-finals. Coleman Presnell also make it into the octo-finals with a 3-3 record. Lindsey Oswald, also 3-3 in prelims, took control for the Choctaws in the out-rounds, making it all the way to the semi-finals before falling to the eventual tournament winner. Oswald also finished second in the Varsity Top Speaker competition.

The members of the MC Speech and Debate Team who attended were Lunyou, a Senior Foreign Language major from Olive Branch; Cantrell, a Junior from Forks, WA; Sims, a Senior Political Science major from New Orleans, LA; Oswald, a Freshman from Clinton; Roberts, a Junior Communication major from Columbus, and Presnell, a Sophomore English major from Brookhaven.

The team will next travel to the Louisiana State University-Shreveport for the "Red River Classic" November 1-17.

CLINTON The Mississippi College Alumni Association will host a "Lunch with James Baker," former United States Secretary of State, on Tuesday, November 12 at 12:00 noon, by reservation only. The lunch will take place in Anderson Hall of the B.C. Rogers Student Center.

James A. Baker III has served in senior government positions under three United States presidents. He served as the nation's 61st Secretary of State from January 1989 through August 1992 under President George Bush. During his tenure at the State Department, Mr. Baker traveled to 90 foreign countries as the United States confronted the unprecedented challenges and opportunities of the post Cold War era. Mr. Baker published *The Politics of Diplomacy*, his reflections on those years of revolution, war and peace.

Baker also served as the 67th Secretary of the Treasury under President Ronald Reagan, and was President Reagan's White House Chief of Staff. Mr. Baker's record of public service began in 1975 as Under Secretary of Commerce to President Gerald Ford and concluded in 1993 as White House Chief of Staff and Senior Counselor to President Bush.

Patricia Bennett wins 2002 Susie Blue Buchanan Award
Professor Patricia W. Bennett has won the 2002 Susie Blue Buchanan Award presented by The Women in the Profession Committee. This award goes annually to a lawyer who displays outstanding leadership, dedication and commitment to the advancement of women in the field of law. The Award is

named for Miss Buchanan, who was the first woman sworn into practice before the Mississippi Supreme Court in 1916.

She briefly became a judge when she served a term as a Special Circuit Judge for the Hinds County Drug Court Diversion Program.

She is a Governor of the 5th Circuit Bar Association and is a trustee of the Mississippi Bar Foundation. She serves on the Supreme Court Advisory Committee on Rules, the Bars Court Liaison and Judicial Administration Committee, and on the Executive Committee of the Charles Clark chapter of the American Inns of Court. She is a past member of The Mississippi Bar Board of Commissioners. She is an active member of the Jackson Metro Black Women Lawyers and the Mississippi Women Lawyers Association.

Symposium on Tort Reform

Presented By Mississippi College Law Review
Friday, November 15, 2002 8:30 a.m. – 4:00 p.m.
MS Dept. of Education Auditorium

Comments by legislators, attorneys, physicians, other interested political organizations, and members of the media have contributed to a growing, intense debate over tort reform. In response to this call for debate, the *Mississippi College Law Review*, in connection with its fall publication project, is hosting this symposium that will examine various tort reform issues. The goal of this symposium is to help create a positive, constructive discussion centered around these various topics. The *Law Review* is pleased to include in its symposium the following visiting scholars:

PROFESSOR MARC GALANTER

Professor Galanter currently serves as the John and Rylla Bosshard Professor of Law and Professor of South Asian Studies at the University of Wisconsin-Madison Law School and Centennial Professor in the Department of Law at the London School of Economics. He received his M.A. and J.D. from the University of Chicago. He has written extensively on legal development in India and on lawyers, litigation, and legal culture in the United States. A leading figure in the empirical study of the legal system, he has been editor of the *Law & Society Review*, President of the Law and Society Association, Chair of the International Commission on Folk Law and Legal Pluralism, a member of the Council on the Role of Courts, and a Guggenheim Fellow. He is a member of the American Law Institute and a Fellow of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences. As a close student of litigation trends in the United States, he has been an outspoken critic of misrepresentations of the American civil justice system and of the inadequate knowledge base that makes the system so vulnerable to misguided attacks.

PROFESSOR NEIL VIDMAR

Professor Vidmar currently serves as the Russell M. Robinson II Professor of Law at Duke Law School. He received his B.A. from MacMurray College, and his M.A. and Ph.D. from the University of Illinois. After joining the faculty of the Department of Psychology at the University of Western Ontario, Canada, he attended Yale Law School as a Russell Sage Fellow in Law. He continued his studies in law informally as a Research Fellow at the Battelle Seattle Research Center in Seattle, Washington. Professor Vidmar is co-author with Valerie Hans of *Judging the Jury* (1986), author of *Medical Malpractice and the American Jury* (1995) and editor-author of *World Jury Systems* (Oxford University Press, 2000). He has written over 100 articles, chapters and reports that include the following subjects: the jury system; small-claims courts; exemplary damages; rights consciousness and dispute resolution; procedural justice; privacy; and attitudes toward the death penalty. With his co-investigator, Professor Shari Diamond of the American Bar Foundation and Northwestern Law School, he is currently engaged in a study of civil juries in Arizona that is being carried out in conjunction with the Pima County, Arizona Superior Court and supported by the National Science Foundation and the State Justice Institute. That project has videotaped the actual deliberations of 50 civil juries and is providing unprecedented insights into how juries perform their duties. Professor Vidmar was lead drafter of an amicus brief in *Kumho Tire v. Carmichael* (1999), and drafted an affidavit cited by the Illinois Supreme Court in *Best v. Taylor Machine* (1997), a constitutional case involving

tort reform. His national and international research on pretrial prejudice is documented in a recent article, "Case Studies of Pre-and Mid-trial Prejudice in Criminal and Civil Litigation," *26 Law and Human Behavior* 73 (2002). He also lectures on judging scientific evidence for judicial education programs in the United States and Canada.

PROFESSOR JEFFREY O'CONNELL

Professor O'Connell currently serves as the Samuel H. McCoy II Professor of Law at the University of Virginia Law School. He received his B.A. from Dartmouth College and his J.D. from Harvard Law School. Professor O'Connell's areas of specialization include insurance and torts. He is also a specialist in accident and insurance law and co-author of the principal work which proposed no-fault insurance. He has been a visiting professor at Northwestern, the University of Michigan, Southern Methodist University, the University of Texas at Austin, the University of Washington, and Oxford and Cambridge Universities of England. He was the recipient of Guggenheim fellowships in 1973 and 1979. Since 1966, he has written or co-written twelve books dealing with accident law and over eighty articles including: *Accidental Justice: The Dilemmas of Tort Law* (with Peter A. Bell) (Yale University Press, 1997); *Ending the Lottery: A Consumer Proposal for Medical Malpractice Reform*, 16 pp. (HALT, 1987); "Judges and Real Tort Reform" *DePaul Law Review*; "The McConnell Tort Reform Bill" *Michigan Law & Policy Review*; "At Last: Tort Reform that Both Sides Could Love" *New Jersey Law Journal*; "Balanced Proposals for Product Liability Reform" *St. Louis Law Journal*; "Alternatives to the Tort System for Personal Injury" *San Diego Law Review*; "Foreclosing Medical Malpractice Claims by Prompt Tender of Economic Loss" (with Henson Moore) *Louisiana Law Review*.
