

In Mississippi's Alternate Route Educator licensure program guidelines for educator preparation programs, alternate route candidates must meet licensure criteria for a 3-year, non-renewable license. Once they have received this initial license, then they obtain a full-time teaching position. Once they begin teaching, they must successfully complete two consecutive internships (over 2 semesters within the 3 year license window) in which they are supervised by our faculty, full-time or adjunct, in order to be eligible for a 5-year renewable license.
