CHINESE STUDENTS HELP DOMESTIC STUDENTS WITH CHINESE GRAMMAR AND CONVERSATION

During the spring semester, MC students enrolled in Chinese 102, 202 and 440 received a new homework assignment: conversation partners.

Each enrolled student is required to meet with a Chinese MC student for 40 minutes each week. The students discuss the week's topic, which ranges from hobbies, food, and family to course assignments.

"I love my conversation partner so much!" said Kelley Beth Brashier, a senior English major. "It helped me so much to be able to practice one-onone with a Chinese student, and I also have loved learning about her interests and activities."

When asked if they wanted to participate, a surplus of Chinese students enthusiastically volunteered. Although the program began five weeks ago, students still contact Professor An and volunteer to help.

The Chinese conversation partners are all highly qualified and well-equipped. They are required to pass an oral interview on Chinese phonetics and pronunciation and attend two training sessions on Chineseteaching pedagogy during the course of the semester.

"I am very glad I can be enrolled as a Chinese conversation partner," said Yang Bushang, a first-year graduate student. "To be a Chinese lanquage teacher is my dream, and the Chinese conversation partner program helps me realize that there is still a long way ahead of me to realize my dream. But I can see my progress every day. I get a sense of achievement when I manage to help Crosby (her conversation partner) understand new grammar. Sometimes we also share interesting parts of our cultures: he introduces his favorite American singers, and I recommend to him my favorite Chinese songs. In short, this program benefits me a lot. "

January 2012 marked the inauguration of the International Host Program, which is sponsored by the Mississippi College Office of Global Education. This community-oriented pairing is geared toward helping MC's diverse international population experience the richness of American culture and customs on a personal level.

The program pairs international students with American host families. To become an international host, individuals undergo an application process and attend an educational session that orients them to the program. At this educational session international hosts learn basic guidelines of the program and their responsibilities as international hosts. These responsibilities include:

- Attend a required orientation to receive important information about becoming a host family.
- Try to arrange a time to meet with your student(s) every two weeks – family dinner, going to a park, shopping, etc.
- Invite your student(s) to come to your home for at least one American holiday/year.

- Attend an on-campus event at Mississippi College with your international student(s) once during the academic year.
- 5. Contact the Office of Global Education to update any information or if you have any concerns.

For the spring 2012 semester, the Office of Global Education paired a total of 34 international students from six different countries-China, Korea, Saudi Arabia, Russia, Nepal, and Kyrgyzstan—with 19 American host families. S t u dents and international hosts alike both seem to thoroughly enjoy the relationships they have established with one another as a result of the International Host Program.

"We have really just gotten started, but so far we have enjoyed our students. They are just a joy to be around. We are looking forward to a great spring of activities as well," said Barbie Ferguson, an International Host.
